





Giftedness Defined: Giftedness signifies an inherent ability to surpassingly learn or master one or more domains. It is characterized by deep curiosity, rapid absorption, and a blend of creative and intense focus. However, these traits can also lead to challenges like misdiagnosed (ADHD or Autism), boredom-induced disruptions, asynchronous development and dropout.

Challenges for the Gifted: Gifted individuals may experience challenges in the following fields:

- Academic habits: A lack of grit due to not encountering early academic challenges.
- Social: Difficulty in blending in, leading to feelings of isolation.
- Emotional: A heightened sensitivity causing emotional extremes.
- Performance: Potential underperformance due to disengagement from traditional curriculum.

Identifying Giftedness: Passend employs a systematic approach, gathering insights from the child, teachers, and parents. This is followed by dynamic assessments, trial peer class participation, and if necessary, clinical assessments.

Holistic Curriculum: Beyond the traditional STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts & Languages, Math) approach, Passend incorporates SAGE (Sports, Academics, Games, Emotions and Empathy) ensuring comprehensive exposure.

Passend Education: Drawing inspiration from the Dutch education model, renowned for producing some of the happiest yet academically successful children, Passend Education aims to provide a tailored and inclusive learning experience. 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Giftedness

What is giftedness

Giftedness refers to an innate ability to learn one or more domains in a way that significantly exceeds the norm for an individual's age. It's a unique cognitive ability that influences how an individual perceives, processes, and responds to information. Traditionally this was measured by an IQ 130+ but this is no longer the only measure. We at Passend define the ability to do or learn a skill to expert level faster than 90% of the population.

Characteristics

- Gifted individuals often exhibit a deep curiosity, rapid learning ability, and a high degree of creativity. Their intense focus, combined with heightened sensitivity, sometimes leads to asynchronous development where intellectual growth outpaces emotional or social development.
- Often they are misdiagnosed as ADHD or Autism due to similar behavior patterns. However the root cause is academic and thus needs a different approach.
- Boredom and (Social)Anxieties often cause them to behave disruptively in class or makes them underachieve on purpose. Making once star pupils the frustration of the class teacher.
- High levels of perfectionism and or fixed mindsets make it hard for them to deal with finishing tasks or starting them.
- Often gifted students will pick up a new subject fast, but lose interest just as quickly.

Why do they need our Guidance:

Lack of grit and learning habits:

Many gifted children, due to their innate abilities, rarely face academic challenges early on. This can hinder the development of perseverance and adaptive learning strategies needed for long-term success.

Social development:

Gifted children might feel out of sync with peers, leading to feelings of isolation or being misunderstood. These social mismatches can affect their ability to form meaningful connections with age-mates.

Emotional development:

Their heightened sensitivity and intensity can make them more prone to emotional extremes. Navigating these intense emotions requires guidance to ensure emotional well-being.

Disengagement and Underperformance:

A lack of challenge or misalignment with traditional curriculum can lead to boredom and disengagement. This can mask their abilities, leading to unrecognized potential and underachievement. Sometimes this leads to depression, drop-out of school or worse

Giftedness

How do we identify giftedness

Dynamic assessment:

This is a method that looks not just at a child's current abilities but also their potential. By analyzing how a child learns and adapts during the assessment, we gain insights into their innate capabilities.

Gifted Profiles:

Beyond standard metrics, there are recognizable profiles or patterns of behavior and cognition in gifted individuals. These profiles help in understanding the diverse ways giftedness can manifest. Examples are Betts and Neihart profiles

Parents and Teachers observations:

Often, those who interact with the child daily can provide invaluable insights. Their observations about the child's behaviors, interests, and challenges can be crucial in the identification process.

Clinical assessments:

These are standardized tests conducted by trained professionals to measure cognitive abilities. They provide a structured approach to identifying areas of strength and potential.

Passend Approach to Assessment

Generally, Passend uses information from the trifecta of the Child, the Teacher and the Parents to identify potential markers of giftedness. Upon which, a Dynamic assessment will be done with the child, followed by a trial participation in the Peer class. Finally, if this is not conclusive Clinical Assessments will be recommended if needed.

Smart Games for GRIT

SMART Games

Gifted children can have challenging learning habits like:

- Procrastination: Grasping concepts quickly leads to last-minute work.
- Incomplete Work: Loss of interest after understanding the main idea.
- Avoiding Challenge: Shying away from difficult tasks to appear infallible.
- Poor Organization: Over-relying on memory, neglecting systematic methods.
- Erratic Study Routines: Skipping regular study, leading to cramming.
- Over-Reliance: Depending solely on innate abilities, avoiding external resources.
- Feedback Resistance: Dismissing critique, hindering adaptability.

At Passend Education we use "Smart" games as they are far removed from academic pressure but help with:

- Engagement: Games keep students engaged, reducing procrastination.
- Task Completion: Gamified milestones encourage completion of tasks.
- Incremental Challenge: Games introduce escalating challenges, promoting perseverance.
- Structured Progress: Games have organized levels/tasks, fostering systematic methods.
- Routine Playtime: Regular game interaction instills consistent study habits.
- Computational Strategic Thinking: Smart Games often require strategy or collaboration, promoting resourcefulness and paradigm shifts in the child...
- Feedback Mechanism: Instant feedback in games helps students adapt and improve.

mindset. Grit builds robust, intrinsic self-esteem that values persistence and effort, ensuring that their extraordinary abilities are accompanied by the **thoroughness** and an **indomitable** spirit needed for enduring achievement and personal fulfillment.

Affective Learning

Affective Lessons for Emotional Growth

Gifted kids often struggle social emotionally because:

- Asynchronous Development: Cognitive abilities outpace emotional or social maturity.
- Peer Differences: Advanced interests make relating to age-mates challenging.
- Heightened Sensitivities: Intense reactions to stimuli or perceived injustices.
- Perfectionism: High self-expectations can lead to frustration or self-criticism.
- Isolation: Feeling different or misunderstood by peers.
- Overthinking: Analysis paralysis or anxiety from excessive introspection.
- Unmet Emotional Needs: Lack of similarly gifted peers or supportive environment.

Passend Education uses extensive Affective Learning Modules based on ECHA principles, that offer and practice:

- Tailored Pacing: Modules accommodate asynchronous development, balancing cognitive and emotional growth.
- Relatable Peers: Connects gifted children with like-minded individuals, fostering understanding and friendships.
- Emotional Regulation: Teaches coping strategies for heightened sensitivities and intense reactions.

 Embrace Imperfection: Activities emphasize process over perfection, reducing self-pressure.

 Shared Experiences: Provides a sense of belonging, reducing feelings of isolation.

 Mindfulness Techniques: Helps in managing overthinking, promoting present-focused awareness.

 Supportive Environment: Affirms and validates their experiences, meeting unique emotional needs.

Social Development through Playground Experience

Gifted children often fall behind socially as they struggle to **connect** with other kids their age. Their main challenges are:

- Sensitivity: Overwhelmed by rough or loud play.
- Social Awkwardness: Struggling with age-appropriate social cues.
- Intense Emotions: Misunderstandings can lead to overreactions.
- Preference for Solitude: Often content with independent activities.
- Social Overthinking: Over-analyzing social interactions.
- Peer Rejection: Seen as "different" or "know-it-all".
- Relatability Issues: Difficulty finding common ground.

At **Passend Education** we use "**Simulated and (Un)supervised**" play to help practice and develop the following skills and experiences:

- Diverse Interactions: Encourages mingling with peers of varied abilities and interests.
- Conflict Resolution: Real-time practice in navigating disagreements and finding solutions.
- Sensory Exploration: Tactile experiences nurture their heightened sensitivities positively.
- Collaborative Play: Fosters teamwork, understanding roles and leadership skills.
- Creativity Boost: Unstructured play sparks imagination and inventive play scenarios.
- Age-appropriate Challenges: Engages them at their level while still being with age peers.
- Self-awareness: Helps in recognizing and valuing their unique strengths and challenges.

Gifted children struggle in class daily. Most of their **anxieties**, **aggression** or even **depression** stems from issues in a normal curriculum because of:

- Under-stimulation: Curriculum often lacks depth and complexity for their pace.
- Boredom: Repetition and slow progress lead to disengagement.
- Mismatched Pace: Forced to wait for classmates can cause frustration.
- Lack of Challenge: Few opportunities to tackle advanced topics or skills.
- Overlooked Needs: Achievements overshadow socio-emotional struggles.
- Unmet Potential: Limited exposure to advanced or diverse subjects.
- Lack of Peer Understanding: Difficulty in group tasks due to disparate thought processes or goals.

Passend Education uses individual and group based projects as the cornerstone of gifted education. It helps achieve:

- Depth and Complexity: Allows deep exploration of topics.
- Differentiation and Self-Directed Learning: Fosters autonomy and initiative.
- Purpose and Real-World Application: Bridges theory with practicality.

Why Portfolios are important

Gifted students (if given the opportunity) can outperform normal curriculum measurement standards. Portfolios are an **ideal way to showcase** these abilities. The point of most education is to learn. Equally important is the achievements obtained in the form of grades to gain admission into universities or jobs.

Being a straight 'A' student often no longer sets a student apart. Portfolios can do this exceptionally well.

Reasons to have portfolios are:

- Showcase Depth: Portfolios allow gifted students to display their depth of understanding and the breadth of their explorations in various subjects.
- Document Progress: They provide a chronological record of a student's growth, illustrating their learning trajectory over time.
- Customized Learning: Given their unique learning pace, portfolios offer a tailored representation of their achievements, beyond standardized tests.
- Reflection: Creating a portfolio encourages introspection, helping students understand their strengths, challenges, and areas of passion.
- Validation: A tangible collection of their work validates their efforts and accomplishments, fostering self-confidence.
- **Practical Application:** Portfolios serve as a tool for real-world opportunities, such as admissions or competitions, showcasing their capabilities.
- Holistic Representation: Unlike test scores, portfolios provide a comprehensive view of a student's abilities, including creativity, problem-solving, and critical thinking.
